

The throbbing heart of the city lies 250 metres off-shore on an island linked to the mainland by the Al Maqtaa Bridge and Mussafah Bridge. Home to the respected Abu Dhabi Cultural Foundation and the Al Hosn Palace museum, along with numerous venues for the arts, the wealthy city is the cultural as well as the commercial hub of the emirate of Abu Dhabi.





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THE CITY

Abu Dhabi can trace its history way back to the Bronze Age and has a long tradition of profitable trading, but it wasn't until the 1950's – when oil was found – that it was transformed from its desert landscape into the fabulous city it is today. Designed in a grid-like fashion with wide open spaces and boulevards, it is the second largest city in the oil-rich United Arab Emirates, after its neighbour Dubai. It is the seat of government and the capital of the emirate of Abu Dhabi.

Daily life centres around its main thoroughfares, including the busy Sheikh Zayed Street and the paved waterfront Corniche. Always bustling, the Corniche is where visitors can be seen admiring the stunning pink-washed Emirates Palace at the Ras Al Bateen, built as a hotel for visiting royalty, and locals can be seen jogging or cycling with much enthusiasm. Families with children and leisure walkers regularly enjoy the atmosphere.

A short walk from the waters edge are streets full of shiny new skyscrapers that house the city's financial and banking institutions, its world famous company offices and its government buildings. At pavement-level, hotel and restaurants cater for every taste, while shopping malls are full of designer fashions. In contrast, the many souqs offer gold, spices or traditional craft items.

The Corniche sweeps along the waterfront from one side of the city to other, passing by the lavishly-planted Al Markaziyah Gardens, one of the many parks in the city, and Lulu Island across the water, which is delightful with its palm trees and nature reserve.

Abu Dhabi's attractions are diverse – from landmark architectural triumphs to centuries-old structures and beaches.

Emirates Palace

Dominating the skyline along the Corniche, the massive Emirates Palace oozes opulence and luxury. Built as a hotel, one of the finest in the world, it is worth seeing – even if the room rates are out of budget. Look out for the Triumphant Arch under which royals pass if staying in the palace and its gardens full of fountains. The palace is famous for its gold-plated lobby, roof frescos and crystal chandeliers.

Al Maqtaa Fort

Built to protect the city from invaders around 200 years ago, this fort stands close to the Al Maqtaa Bridge on its approach to Abu Dhabi city. Built in the traditional style of the day in soft sand coloured stone with ornately carved wooden features, and remaining almost intact, it is considered an important historical reminder of the city's past.

Emirates Heritage Village

A Bedouin desert camp complete with tents made from goat's hair, a bustling souq, mud hut village and a fishing harbour are all reconstructions that make fascinating displays in the Emirates Heritage Village. Visitors can sometimes try their hand at traditional crafts like pottery or weaving, which are demonstrated in a series of small workshops within the village. It sits on the breakwater overlooking Abu Dhabi's Corniche.

Sheikh Zayed Bin Sultan Al Nahyan Mosque

A fabulous white structure and a landmark in Abu Dhabi, the mosque was built to incorporate architectural influences from around the world. Moroccan, Italian, Chinese and styles from the UAE itself can be detected. There are over 1,000 columns and 80 domes decorated with marble and semi-precious stones, while huge courtyards and lakes can be seen in the grounds. The mosque has four minarets on its corners. It is named after Sheikh Zayed Bin Sultan Al Nahyan, president of the UAE for over 30 years.

Qasr Al Hosn Palace

Built in 1761 as a royal residence and the city's oldest building, this beautiful palace can be found next to the Abu

Dhabi Cultural Foundation. Its main entrance is decorated in true Islamic style with colourful tiles, while inside mashrabiya screens and carved wooden doors have stood for centuries.

Women's Handicraft Centre

No visit to Abu Dhabi would be complete without a visit to this fascinating centre. Local female Bedouin artists and artisans, usually wearing a traditional dress, demonstrate age-old crafts, including henna body painting, embroidery and silver thread work in a series of small huts. Visitors should remove their shoes before entering the huts as is the local custom.

Whether you choose to haggle for a bargain in a bustling market – otherwise known as a souq – or spend time in a lavish air conditioned mall just off the Corniche, shopping in Abu Dhabi will be a memorable experience.

Traditional purchases include carpets, rugs, textiles, gold and spices, all of which can be found in dedicated souqs where lots of stalls selling the same thing are grouped together. An example is the Gold Souq, found not far from the Sheikh Rashid Bin Saeed Al-Maktoum Street. Such items can be found in general souqs too, or in specialist shops.

Souqs are also good for finding antiques or craft items to take home as souvenirs. In contrast, the shopping malls tend to be full of expensive jewellery and designer fashions. Among the best are the Abu Dhabi Mall in the Tourist Club Area (Tel: +971 2 645 4858, www.abudhabi-mall.com), where you can shop for just about anything from big names like Betty Barclay and the Early Learning Centre.

The Marina Mall in The Corniche (Tel: +971 2 681 8300, www.marinamall.ae) is another excellent mall. The Khalifa Centre, which lies to the north of the city near the Mosque Gardens, is a great place to find traditional crafts (Tel: +971 2 667 9900).

Airport

Flights arrive into Abu Dhabi International Airport from

around the world. The airport, the second largest in the United Arab Emirates, has a full range of facilities for travellers, from ATM's to tourist information. It lies just over 30 kilometres from the city centre, with three major highways, the Salam Street (Highway 8), Sheikh Rashid Al Maktoum Street (Highway 2) and the Khaleej Al Arabi (Highway 30) ensuring quick transfers. Abu Dhabi Airport Taxis are available outside the airport, with around AED 70 charged for the journey into the city.

Taxi

Getting around Abu Dhabi is straightforward, with most visitors opting to travel in the inexpensive taxis that dart around the city constantly. It's a simple process of flagging a taxi down, telling the driver your destination and paying the small amount required for the ride. The base rate is AED 3 and an additional AED 75 added per kilometre thereafter. Taxis can be booked through several companies. They have regular parking slots outside hotels and shopping malls too.


