THE CITY

Toulouse, often known as Ville Rose – the “Pink City” – due to its red-brick buildings, that seem to subtly change colour throughout the day, is one of France’s most vibrant provincial cities. Once a city that inspired the medieval poets of courtly love, Toulouse has become a pioneering centre of technology and aerospace development.

Through all its many faces, Toulouse hangs on to a resolutely old-fashioned French soul, with its markets, regional cuisine and cafés interspersed between second-hand bookstalls and antique shops. This 2,000-year-old historical city shows off its brick and tile architecture, typical of the cities, villages and farms of the Midi-Pyrenees region.

France's fourth biggest city has a lot to offer, and a stroll along the Garonne and the Canal du Midi is a perfect way to spend the day. With its 2,000-year-old history, Toulouse will satisfy everyone with an interest for architecture and museums but there are also activities for the more active traveller. Hire a bike and pedal the 40km long way from Toulouse to Port Lauragais on the south bank.

Basilique St-Sernin

Europe's largest Romanesque church contains the tomb of Saint Sernin, a martyr and bishop who helped spread Christianity into Toulouse and suffered a horrific death after being dragged to his death in 250 AD.

The Basilique St-Sernin church is worth a visit. It's the ceiling that attracts the most attention, not least from the surrealist artist himself, Salvador Dali, who, so enraptured by its array of red and green bricks, used the pattern in his Santiago El Grande painting.

Rich, decadent and delicious, Toulouse is definitely not the place to head for if you're intending to shed a few pounds. And who would want to when you can enjoy meaty cassoulets, luxurious foie gras, duck, and the famous Toulouse sausage.

One of the best places to enjoy a delicious yet cheap lunch is the covered market at Place Victor Hugo, where you have got at least five or six restaurants above the marketplace, serving up delicious meals made from the freshest local produce, straight off the stalls below.

SHOPPING

To get to the real essence of Toulouse, the covered markets at Place Victor Hugo are definitely worth a visit. Ideal for a morning of browsing, you can wander past the stalls, burgeoning with fresh fish, vegetables, garlic and ripe flavoursome cheese. It is open everyday except Mondays from 6.00 to 13.00 at Place Victor Hugo.

If the skies are clear, and the sun is shining, it might be worth making the most of it by heading to the outdoor markets. The Marche Cristal, known as the Market of the Boulevard by the locals, is a friendly little market, where the stalls are shaded by the plane trees. It is open everyday except Mondays from 6.00 to 13.00. The Sunday market of the Place Saint-Aubin is also very typical of Toulouse, with stalls scattered around the basilica of Saint-Aubin.

However, if you're after something to feed your mind rather than your stomach, it's worth checking out Toulouse's many second-hand book markets. The older historic area of the city known as Les Carmes, near to the Capitol, has a welcoming bohemian air and wealth of antique shops waiting to be discovered. The Market of the Place Saint-Etienne is a second-hand booksellers found in front of Saint-Etienne cathedral. Open on Saturdays from 9.30 to 18.00.

For the more serious, the main shopping street, the Rue de Rome, is the best place to head. Here, you'll find a wealth

of shoe shops and clothing stores, with the odd designer boutique, second-hand jewellery shops and intriguing little kitsch stores thrown in.

For something really "typical" of Toulouse, you should look out for scarves and other accessories dyed with woad, a type of dye well-known throughout the region that produces a beautiful shade of indigo.

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Toulouse-Blagnac International Airport

The Toulouse-Blagnac International Airport is approximately 8km north-west of the city centre. Toulouse is easily accessible via Paris, with over 30 flights running daily between the two cities.

Buses connect the airport to the city station and the

"Flybus Airport Shuttle" depart every 20 minutes from 5.00 to 00.15. The journey takes approx. 20 minutes and a one way-ticket costs €5. You can buy the ticket from the driver in the bus or at the Tisséo Sales Outlet inside the airport.

There are also a number of public transport bus lines to choose from.

Public Transport

Because of the small size of the city the public transportation system is not too big but there are buses and metro lines to choose from. You buy the tickets for both types of vehicles either in advance in a kiosk or a super market or directly on board.

The city's main train station, Gare Matabiau on Boulevard Pierre Sernard is just to the north-east of the city centre. From here you can catch trains (SNCF) to major French destinations including Bordeaux, Lourdes and Montauban.

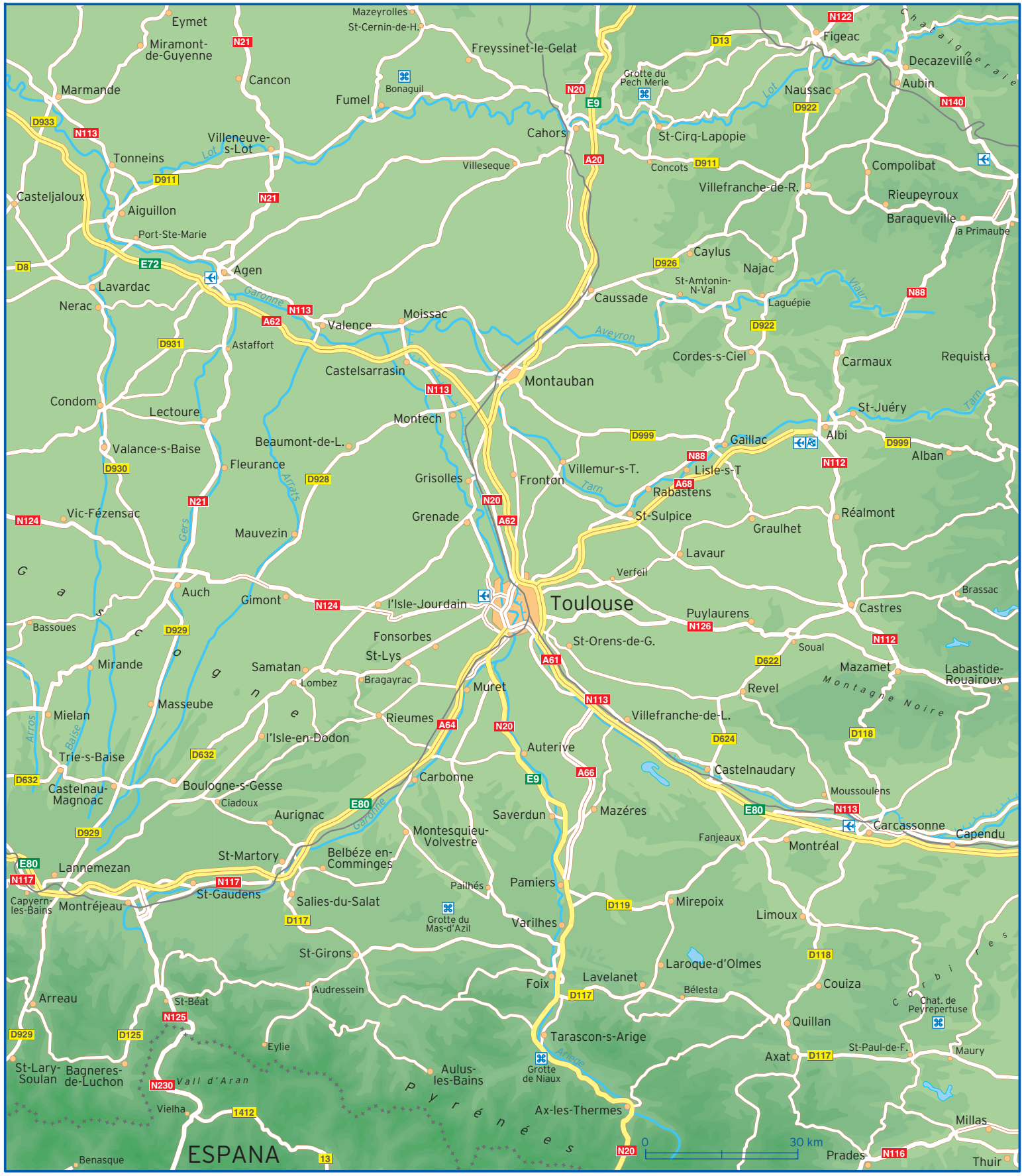

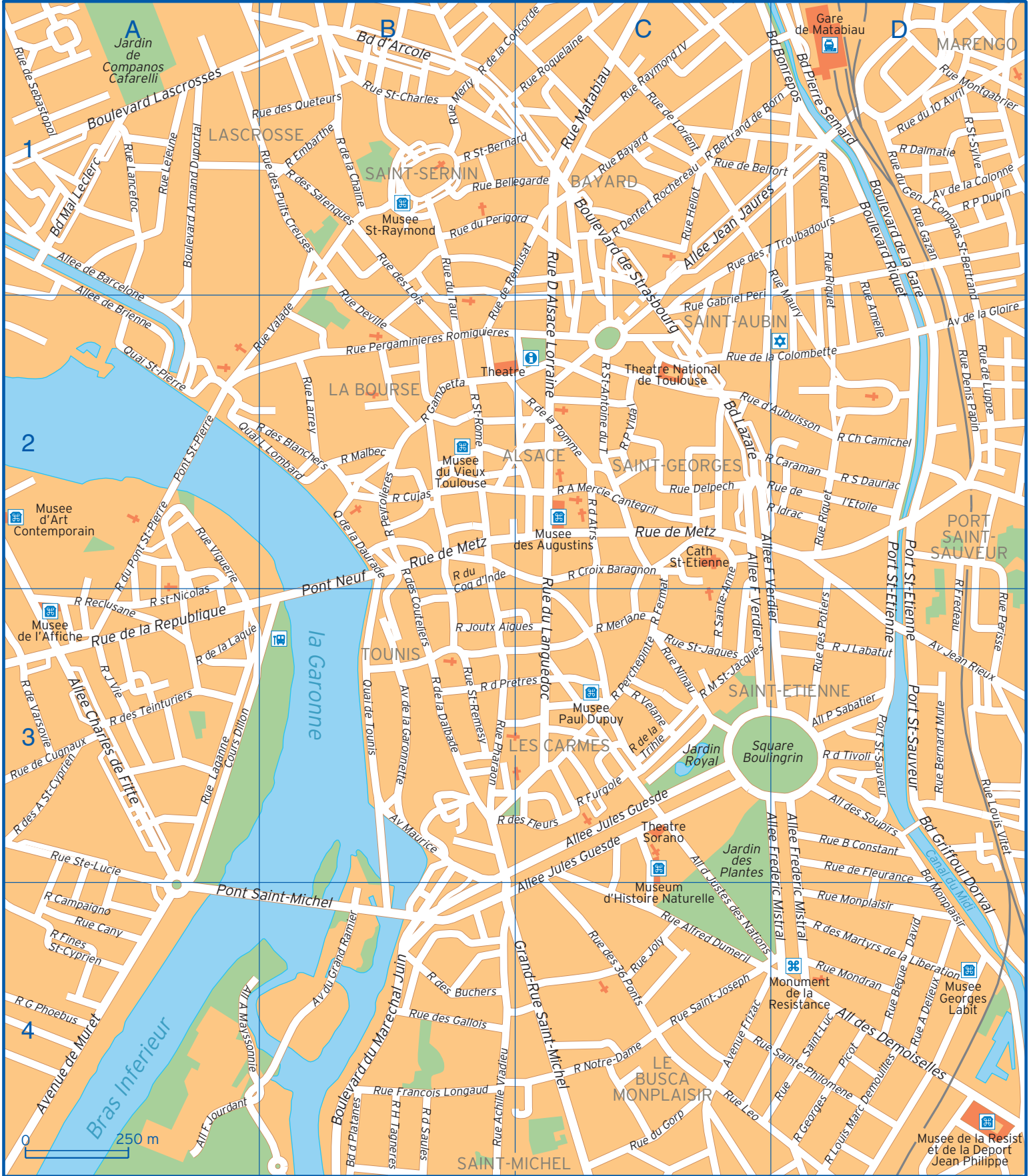
