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# THE CITY

Glasgow has Roman roots. In 80 AD, the General Marcus Agricola built a series of fortresses here as protection against the aggressive tribes of the north. According to legend, Saint Mungo, who had once been expelled from the village of Fife with his mother, founded the city. St. Mungo is said to have built the first Christian church close to Molendinar Burn.

Glasgow became a city in the 12th century and was given permission to hold a weekly market. The city grew rapidly and a new cathedral was erected in the East End. Glasgow expanded westwards in the 18th century. The city's tobacco traders had, what was in effect, a monopoly on the European trade and simply left the dirty city to establish a new area, called The Merchant City.

In the 1800s, Glasgow's shipyards were working at full capacity and the city experienced a Golden Age. The areas now known as the City and the fashionable West End, were built at this time. Housing for the working-class was created south of the river. After a few difficult decades in which it lost many of its shipyards, Glasgow today is a city on the rebound and is now seen as one of the coolest in Britain.

Glasgow has three main shopping districts - the Merchant City, Buchanan Street, and the West End. The Merchant City's beautiful old buildings now house street fashion shops like Tribal Junki and Dr Jives, but also make room for Armani and Versace. The Jigsaw store on 177 Ingram Street, housed in a stylish converted bank, is a must.

Around the city's main street - Buchanan Street - the shopping options are more traditional. The usual cadre of chain stores, like Boots and Marks & Spencer, and branches of Miss Sixty, Diesel and Urban Outfitters.

The gigantic Buchanan Galleries and the pricy Princess Square are good for efficient shopping. In the West End area, most shops are on or around Byres Road, a more sophisticated version of the typical British High Street. Intersected with coffee shops and restaurants are small boutiques like bag retailer Pink Poodle and vintage fashion store Starry Starry Night. There is also a Fopp record store and a cosy deli called Hearts Buchanan, that stocks smoked Islay ham and cheddar from the Isle of Mull.

Argyll Arcade - just off Buchannas Street - with it's early 19th-century features, has antique stores and jewellers. Don't miss the Barras, the Saturday morning flea market in the East End, with over 1,000 stalls. The atmosphere, the people watching and listening to the city's own working-class slang - the Patter - make a visit worthwhile. On the way to the market, pop in to G1 interiors, a contemporary Scottish interior design store in desolate Trongate.






