Washington is a city of contrasts. While it might be best recognized in its political role, DC wants the world to know that it has much more to offer than governmental gossip and diplomatic deals. Divided into districts, each neighbourhood represents another distinct feature that adds to the diverse characteristics breathing life into the city.

While isolated Georgetown is bustling with new, trendy boutiques and restaurants, Shaw, once the site of racial tension and riot, is undergoing a revitalization program to make it a hot destination for African-American heritage tours. Downtown might offer theatres, galleries and the best Chinese food in the Chinatown restaurants, while the New U district, where Duke Ellington once played, is the in vogue neighborhood for hearing live music. And amid all this, let's not forget the political and military monuments and memorials along the National Mall. It is in this area that you'll also find the wonderful Smithsonian complex of museums.

The city is a melting pot of cultures and communities, which have a fantastic influence on restaurants in particular. Whatever your culinary preferences, DC can cater to them, be it French, American or Ethiopian. Spread out across the city, all the choices are on offer. Additionally, one of the key aspects of Washington, DC is that, despite being crammed with different tastes, smells, sights and sounds, it is not claustrophobic. DC's

neighborhoods are spread out over an expanse that is broken up by generous oases of green space, giving the city that sense of liberation and harmony which it strives to promote.

#### **SHOPPING**

For a serious shopping spree, Georgetown is probably the most famous area for a bit of retail therapy but many DC neighborhoods have enough boutiques, markets and designer stores to make the city a shopper's paradise.

Malls are generally located in more suburban areas but their popularity ensures they are easily accessible. These shopping districts are recommended:

#### Georgetown

The 'daddy' of places to shop in DC, Georgetown has something to keep everyone happy. This is where most of the big chains are located - Zara, Urban Outfitters, H&M and Victoria's Secret are based here and, despite Georgetown's cobbled street charm, retail development is ongoing. Seek out Barnes & Noble's wonderfully old-fashioned flagship store where book lovers will be in their element.

For designer fiends, Ralph Lauren is among several high-class stores scattered about the neighborhood. There are plenty of smaller, more alternative boutiques in addition to an abundance of music, art and antique shops to keep bargain hunters busy. Look out for Georgetown's largest gallery, Creighton-Davis (3222 M St, NW), and Village Art & Craft (1353 Wisconsin Ave, NW) for funky, ethnic jewelry and knick-knacks.

#### **Downtown and Chinatown**

Downtown is DC's department store center. Downtown Washington borders Pennsylvania Avenue, the direct route between the White House and the Capitol. A few central malls including the Old Post Office Pavilion and The Shops at National Place are quieter alternatives to the suburban giants further out of town. Wafts of sweet and sour pork are also likely to drift by in the Downtown area since you are just around the corner from Chinatown.

#### Friendship Heights

Next stop Maryland. In the far northwest of the city, the swanky Friendship Heights area is home to some of the most exclusive retail outlets in DC. Along with designer stores including Banana Republic and the furniture manufacturer Pottery Barn, the Mazza Gallerie mall is another upscale establishment featuring a variety of costly boutiques. Neiman Marcus fashion is based here, while a short walk further along Wisconsin Avenue will get you to Tiffany, St-Laurent Rive Gauche and Cartier.



#### The New U District

The New U District is the new home to some of the trendiest shops in the city. You'll find the quirky, the kitsch and the truly bizarre spilling out of second-hand and alternative boutiques along U Street and 14th St, NW. If you're tired of seeing the same brands again and again elsewhere, look for gems like Home Rule (1807 14th St, NW), selling original variations on regular home wares, and Pulp (1803 14th St, NW), for unusual and funky gifts.

Besides delicious fresh produce, the Eastern Market also sells soaps, candles, pottery, jewelry and almost anything else you can think of. There's also an irresistible flea market just across the street.

#### **Airports**

Three major airports serve DC:

National Airport is accessible by Metro (Yellow/Blue Line), the Washington Flyer (www.washfly.com, 6 a.m.-11 p.m. Mon-Fri, 8 a.m.-11 p.m. Sat/Sun, \$18 round trip ticket) operates a shuttle from West Falls Church Metro



Station-Dulles, and BWI can be reached by Maryland Rail Commuter trains (only weekends) and Amtrak trains (between DC's Union Station and a terminal near BWI). SuperShuttle (+1 800 258 3826, www.supershuttle.com, 5:30 a.m.-1230am, National/Dulles) offers a door-to-door service in a shared shuttle bus.

A taxi to National Airport from the National Mall takes approximately 15 minutes and costs \$12. Dulles and BWI are a little further from the center at 26 miles (42 km), which makes a taxi trip about \$55, and 30 miles (48 km), which makes a taxi trip about \$60, respectively.

#### Time Zone

Washington, D.C. is in the Eastern time zone, and all times are reflected in eastern time.

#### **Public Transport**

Public transport in Washington consists of the super-efficient Metrorail and bus services. Computerized fare cards are available from self-service machines at the stations. The minimum fare is \$1.65 depending on the time of day and the distance traveled. One-day passes at \$8 to weekly ones at \$35 are available.

The bus service in DC provides services throughout the city and to outlying suburbs. Stops are marked by red, white and blue signposts. The fixed fare is \$1.35 (\$3.10 on express routes) and kids travel free. Be sure to have exact change ready for the automatic fare machines.

DC is based around eight geographical zones, and a cab fare is determined by how many of these you cross during your ride, as well as the time of day you travel and the number of passengers. 


